In order to prepare a Neighbourhood Plan, the first formal stage is to designate the Neighbourhood Area (see Neighbourhood Planning (General) Regulations 2012 (as amended)). The 'qualifying body' (the Parish or Town Council) has to apply to Babergh District Council to designate a neighbourhood area, stating its reasons and submitting a map of the proposed area.

Babergh District Council received an application from Little Waldingfield Parish Council to designate a Neighbourhood Area to enable the production of a Neighbourhood Plan. A statutory consultation as set out in the Neighbourhood Planning (General) Regulations 2012 (as amended) was undertaken by Babergh District Council between Friday 10 February 2017 and Friday 10 March 2017

Little Waldingfield Parish Council initiated the community led planning process via a public meeting on Saturday 24th September 2016, to which over 60 village residents came to hear a presentation by councillors. They began by explaining some of the pressures on our village, including the current shortfall of new house building in the area. To be able to influence future development, in terms of what, where and how, four alternative community-led planning options were available, with increasing degrees of community involvement and concomitant legal affect:
 Village Design Statement e.g. Wotham Village Plan e.g. Baylham Parish Plan e.g. Bacton Neighbourhood Plan e.g. Lavenham
Many questions were fielded from the floor, clearly demonstrating the passion villagers have for the village and a determination to be involved in its future development. At the end, a straw poll showed overwhelming support for a Neighbourhood Plan, even though this will require the greatest degree of volunteer commitment and time to prepare / take the draft plan through all necessary examination and approval steps.
In November 2016, all residents of the parish were leafleted with details of four possible community-led plans, with a ballot form with five choices attached. 81 forms being returned from around 160 dwellings. A total of 151 votes were cast, from a population of around 360 residents', including children, with the votes cast as follows:
 Village Design Statement: 2 votes Village Plan: 4 votes Parish Plan: 7 votes Neighbourhood Plan: 132 votes, which equates to 87.4% of the votes cast Do Nothing: 6 votes
At the LWPC meeting held on the 26th January 2017, the councillors reviewed outcomes of their meetings with Bill Newman (Babergh District Council) and Carroll Reeve (Lavenham Parish Council chairman), held to better understand the process of developing a Neighbourhood Plan (NP). Councillors resolved that Little Waldingfield's Neighbourhood Plan should proceed as follows:
The Little Waldingfield Parish Boundary will define the geographical scope of the NP area i.e. No parts of the
parish to be excluded. • The constitution and composition of the NP Steering Group will be decided once the NP area has been designated
and after a meeting with volunteers. • The Clerk will formally apply to Babergh District Council for the NP area to be designated.
