

BENTLEY NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN 2018-2036
LOCAL GREEN SPACE ASSESSMENT

The parish of Bentley has several important 'green spaces' that are either within or close to the Built Up Area Boundary.

Paragraph 99 and 100 of the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF 2019) identifies the possibility of identifying green spaces that meet certain characteristics as "Local Green Spaces".

The paragraphs state:

99. The designation of land as Local Green Space through local and neighbourhood plans allows communities to identify and protect green areas of particular importance to them.

Designating land as Local Green Space should be consistent with the local planning of sustainable development and complement investment in sufficient homes, jobs and other essential services.

Local Green Spaces should only be designated when a plan is prepared or updated, and be capable of enduring beyond the end of the plan period.

- 100. The Local Green Space designation should only be used where the green space is :
- a) in reasonably close proximity to the community it serves;
- b) demonstrably special to a local community and holds a particular local significance, for example because of its beauty, historic significance, recreational value (including as a playing field), tranquillity or richness of its wildlife; and
- c) local in character and is not an extensive tract of land

This paper provides an assessment of the green spaces in the village against the criteria in paragraph 100 in order to support the designation of local green spaces in the emerging Bentley Neighbourhood Plan.

The Identified Green Spaces



A list of the green spaces is detailed below. Some of the spaces are grouped together but have different attributes.

- 1. School Playing Field
- 2. Play Area
- 3. The Copse
- 4. Land Behind Village Hall
- 5. Silver Leys Green
- 6. War Memorial

The following pages provide a detailed assessment of the identified spaces to ascertain whether they conform with the Local Green Space definition of the NPPF.





	There are plans to create a community nature conservation project as suggested in the Landscape Appraisal for the Neighbourhood Plan by adding bird and bat boxes to trees and to create a wild flower meadow.
