
The Parish Plan Exercise

Funding for parish plan exercises became available from the Countryside Agency in July 2001, following the publication of the Government White Paper of November 2000 entitled 'Our Countryside - The Future', in which the idea of parish and town plans was launched.

The project, called 'Vital Villages', was aimed at helping rural communities to 'help themselves' by identifying what they need in order to remain successful or to improve. By consulting the local people, it is ensured that the views of those who live in and care about their village and parish, are properly reflected in any initiatives that may follow. It is also intended that, with advice and support, communities can implement some improvements locally.

An open meeting in the village hall, in October 2004 arranged by the Parish Council, confirmed an interest in Whatfield having a village plan.

At that meeting six members of the community volunteered to set up a steering group. Others offered to help the project in different ways as it progressed - for example, by delivering and collecting questionnaires. The meeting also provided the newly elected Steering Group with an opportunity to discover what issues were important to Whatfield's residents.



Suggestion boxes were place in The Street and the Village Hall and many people took the opportunity to air their view by this means. The Steering Group did not actually obtain funding from the Countryside Agency but were set on their way by a generous donation from the locality budget of Jeremy Pembroke, our County Councillor.

The Group also attended courses with, and were assisted by, Suffolk ACRE a charity founded in 1937 to tackle the economic, social and environmental needs of communities in Suffolk.

The steering group went on to design a household questionnaire. It dealt mainly with access to essential services, leisure opportunities and community facilities.

The questionnaire also asked a few household questions which were designed to give us all an opportunity to glimpse the general composition of the village homes although the questionnaire was completely confidential.

At the same time we used the opportunity to distribute a completely separate Suffolk ACRE housing needs questionnaire. This was analysed by Suffolk ACRE who found no overall specific cases of housing need in Whatfield. While it may be true there were few in specific need, the Village Plan Questionnaire itself showed a majority who would like to see more affordable homes in the village.

With the help of volunteers, Questionnaires were distributed at the end of 2006 to almost all of our 130 households (some were not inhabited at the time).
88 completed forms in sealed envelopes were collected. This was a little disappointing 68% response. Thank you to all those who did respond.

The steering group has analysed the data set out in the answers given and drawn some conclusions. These conclusions have led to the construction of an action plan involving all relevant organisations - Suffolk County Council, Babergh District Council, Whatfield Parish Council, the Police Authority, the Village Hall Management Committee and Neighbourhood Watch.

Whatfield in the past



The parish of Whatfield is situated on 1599 acres of high ground, 3 miles north of Hadleigh.

The name Whatfield has not changed dramatically since the 11th Century when it was know as Quatefelda. By 1042 the 'Qu' had become 'W' and hence the village became 'Watefelda' - a short step to today's Whatfield.

In 1086 the recorded population was 35 and the village boasted one mill.

A wooden Saxon church is said to have stood on the slight rise where St. Margaret's of Antioch now stands. A flint church was constructed on the sight in the 13th century. The churches first recorded patron was Ben de Cokefield in 1330. In the 1500's a Tudor brick porch was added.

The Whatfield Registers, which began in 1585, are still intact.



The work of the United Reform Church began in 1787 and the current Chapel was purchased in 1843. A notice board in the front garden of Chapel Cottages is the only pointer to the Chapel which is unusual being a brick built lean-to across the back of the pair of cottages.

The Salvation Army presence in Whatfield began in the early 1800's in a thatched cottage that lay back from the road near Church Lane. Land was purchased and the present hall erected in 1924.



Whatfield National Voluntary School was built in 1859 on 1 rood (1/4 acre) of glebe land bounded on the east side by cottages and to the North the public highway leading from Whatfield Church to the Rectory.

"Premises to be erected and used for the education of children and adults of the labouring and manufacturing and other poorer classes of the Parish of Whatfield".

The Whatfield Parish Council held it's first meeting on Thursday 13th December, 1894 in the school room of Whatfield school.

The first Clerk to the Council was paid £5 per year and it remained at this level for 45 years!

Buckles meadow takes its' name from Fred Buckledee who leased the land from the Church Commissioners in about 1850.

In 1983 there was a meeting in the village hall to discuss conservation issues of glebe land. The meadow was purchased, for the village, by the Parish Council for £4,000.


The meadow is one of the few left uncultivated in Suffolk.

Whatfield today



The last figures published show the Parish of Whatfield to be made up of 134 households with a total population of 310 people. The vast majority of properties are owner occupied. Only 3 new houses have been built in Whatfield since the 1991 census.

Over the last 25 years, whilst the population has remained fairly static, the village has lost 2 shops (one with Post Office facilities), a garage and pub. This may be inevitable due to many factors, such as out of town retail development and soaring property prices, however Whatfield can boast a fine primary school which has seen two new extensions built over the same period that the other services declined.



A strong village community spirit has been responsible for raising much of the money for these constructions. For more info: www.whatfield.suffolk.sch.uk

The village hall, in part supported and used by the school, provides a valuable

community meeting place and, together with the playing field host the, well supported, annual Village Fete, which has in recent years been expanded to include a very successful



under 11's five-a-side football competition.

The hall also supports an active indoor bowls club which meets weekly and from time to time provides a venue for the ever popular Whatfield Players.


After 900 years of retaining its' own parish priest, the picturesque Anglican St. Margaret's Church now shares a Rector with our five neighbouring parishes.



The United Reform Church continues as a place of worship and social meeting place.

The Salvation Army Hall is not only a place of regular worship but, since 1999, hosts a bi-weekly CAMEO (come and meet each other) get-together.

The community owned land and village spaces are well cared for by the Parish Council's team of Land Management, Wild Life, Tree and Footpath volunteers. They are currently in discussions with Babergh and Suffolk Wildlife Trust as how best we can maintain and improve our countryside environment.




Findings from the completed questionnaires

Proposed ACTIONS are set out after many of the findings. These actions have been listed in a table towards the end of this report, together with the names of the groups most likely to be involved in tackling them.

We have also suggested a timescale for these actions which may take several years to implement.

Progress in tackling the matters mentioned will be discussed at the regular Parish Council meetings.

It may not be possible (or practicable) to implement the suggested actions but it is certainly worth trying.




What we like most about living in Whatfield

- The pure enjoyment of living in the countryside was far and away the most popular reason given for enjoying Whatfield living. Many mention the delightful views.
- Peace and quiet and a good community spirit are comments that were repeated time and time again in the replies.
- Good neighbours and friendly people reinforced the view above.
- Being close to (but far enough away) from the amenities provided by Hadleigh.
- Freedom from urban attitudes and a relaxing way of life were other popular responses.
- Many people enjoy the local walks.
- ☐ The lack of crime and general safety was cited by many residents as an import factor in their affection for Whatfield.
- There were many other individual reasons given for why we like living in Whatfield including our lack of street lights, being woken up by cockerels and being near to the Buy Rite store!

The Household Survey

This part of the questionnaire provides us with some background information about our households. It was completed by everyone who participated in this survey.




88 households completed the questionnaire.


These households are made up of 200 adults and children, 96 of whom are females and 104 males with over half the population in the 25-75 age group.

- 12 homes (14%) do not have a lagged hot water tank;
- 9 homes (10%) do not have loft insulation;
- 20 homes (23%) do not have double glazing;
- 43 (49%) do not have cavity wall insulation.
- 52 homes (59%) are reducing their consumption of electricity by using low energy light bulbs.
- * 2 properties have solar heating.

Some properties cannot be insulated due to their age and the method of construction. The figures, however, do suggest that there could be some relatively modern properties that do not have insulation and are therefore using far more energy than they need to.





The Personal Survey

In this main section of the report, it should be appreciated that not all 200 respondents chose to answer every question. Any percentages given relate to the number of people answering the whole or part of a question.



Our Population


How long have you lived in Whatfield?

182 people answered this question

The survey confirms what we see with our own eyes - that there is a frequent sale of properties. Around 20% of properties have changed hands in the last 5 years.



As the chart below shows there are however a large number of well settled people who give the village a welcome stability.



Education

Numbers of children attending some form of preschool, school or college.

18 households answered this question

There are a total 37 children attending some form of educational establishment.

9 children attend various preschool groups.

9 children are at primary school of which 4 attend Whatfield Primary.

13 children attend secondary schools.

6 young persons are at university or college.

Personal Transport

How many road vehicles are used by your household?

88 households answered this question

Surprisingly there are 70 bicycles in the 88 households who answered this question.

Less surprising are the 134 cars and 12 vans i.e. well over one and a half cars per household.

Only 8 motorcycles were recorded.

Information and Communication

Which of the following do you personally read/use to gain information about what is happening in and around Whatfield?

172 people answered this question

123 (72%) name The Grapevine magazine as their main source of information about what is happening.

122 (71%) also cite The Roundabout.


107 (62%) use the more tradition local newspapers.

58 (34%) look at the notice board on the corner of Wheatfields.

38 (22%) mention the Village Hall notice boards.

118 (68%) find that word of mouth is useful. This healthy percentage would seem to point to a good community spirit.

The Roundabout being the area Church magazine has wider backing whereas our more neighbourhood based Grapevine relies exclusively on very local sources of income.

169 people answered this question

Of the 169 people who answered this Question 69 (41%) never access the internet.

At the other end of the scale 51 people (30%) use the internet at home on a daily basis with 34 (20%) doing so at work.

Of Whatfield's 22 school children, 5 use the internet daily at school 8 weekly and 6 occasionally.


9 people occasionally visit internet cafes and one person uses the facility at a library on a daily basis.

155 people answered this question


104 (67%) answered 'Yes' to this question against 51 'No'.

177 people answered this question




Obvious room for improvement here!

39 (22%) say excellent 117 (67%) say satifactory



It was close with 90 'yes' and 89 'no'.



The results clearly indicate a high level of satisfaction in both the facilities offered and the level of maintenance.

The village hall committee should feel justifiably pleased.

The 'no opinions' represented only 20% of the answers which would seem to be an understandable proportion.

Facilities for the hard of hearing was the only area criticised by more people than those who found it good or reasonable. It is probably a difficult problem to surmount but it could be looked into.



What changes/improvements to the village hall would you like to see?

45 people answered this question

The numbers responding to this question was pleasantly surprising with a whole myriad of suggestions. Many are old chestnuts and the chairs have been upgraded since the survey was carried out.

The full list of comments will be passed to the Village Hall Management Committee however a sprinkling of the major suggestions are given here:


- Provision of changing/showers for both sports and theatre use.
- Larger car park and external lighting.
- ☐ More and improved toilet facilities
- □ Softer interior lighting for functions.
- After school clubs and playgroups.
- More playground facilities with slides and swings etc.
- ☐ Conservatory extension.

If new facilities/clubs/activities could be provided in Whatfield, what would you attend or use?

142 people answered this question

The 142 people who answered this question gave a total of 423 answers between them on a wide range of possible interests.

Film nights emerged as a clear favourite. The cost of providing these evenings is known to be expensive however given the interest it is undoubtedly worth investigating further.



Obviously these activities will not materialise by themselves and the answers to the next question would indicate that there are people out there prepared to assist with these varied activities.



The Community Council, Village Hall Committee and the Parish Council need to use their various media skills to see, if at least, some of the village thirst can be quenched.




Do you think the following educational and leisure activities should be provided for the young people of the village?


Would you like to see any of Whatfield's places of worship used as a meeting place for any of the following activities?

They were a very small number of people answering 'no' to this question however there does seem to be a high level of support for a concert to be held.

It would be interesting to see if anyone could come forward to organise a suitable concert.

165 people answered this question


97 people (59%) feel there is a need for a 'good neighbour' type scheme.

14 people actively said 'no' with 54 (33%) answering 'don't know'

How often would you be prepared to help a Good Neighbour scheme in Whatfield?

149 people answered this question

121 (71%) people indicated they would be prepared to help occasionally, once a month or once a week. Clearly that number of people would not be needed, but from such a large and willing resource there should be no difficulty in setting up and maintaining a scheme in the village.



Are you aware there is a neighbourhood watch scheme in Whatfied?

176 people answered this question


This question threw up some interesting and possibly strange responses.



126 (59%) of those answering the question were aware that a scheme existed, however only 16 (7%) were already members and only 13 people expressed any interest

in joining the scheme. 40 people were not aware a scheme already existed and 20 people actively stated they had no interest in joining a scheme.

The assumption must be that people in Whatfield already feel secure and that they see no need for a Neighbourhood Watch. Possibly the relatively close-knit relationship that many inhabitants enjoy provides its' own unofficial security scheme.




How do you regard the police coverage of Whatfield?

36 people expressed 'no opinion'




Do you feel the following are issues in Whatfield?

It is presumably a sign of satisfaction that only 105 people answered this question and, with the demise of the village pub, almost inevitable that 'Drunkenness' was not mentioned by anyone. 'Drug taking' was an issue for 3 people.

The remaining replies are somewhat predictable:



There has been some vandalism and a few thefts but by-and-large our concerns are small.

It is the dog fouling and litter that perturbs some of us. Several mention litter in The Street and dog fouling seems prevalent on foot paths and village spaces and the possibility of providing further dog litter bins has been raised.


What are you views on the quality of the following services in Whatfield?

186 people answered this question

As the table below shows, most people are satisfied that fundamental services reach good to reasonable levels.

Mobile phone reception received the most "poor" responses with refuse collection the second most "poor".

Although broadband reception only registering a 14% 'poor' rating of all those who replied, this does actually represent around 30% of actual users.

The steering group has investigated the possibility of gas being supplied to the village but the costs would certainly be prohibitive even if many of the people who answered 'no' or 'no opinion' suddenly decided to be 'converted'!

Would you consider joining a bulk heating oil purchase scheme?


174 people answered this question

It is now believed that a few villagers already have some




form of bulk purchasing scheme and perhaps they could assist in the set up of another scheme or perhaps enlarge the current one.

How often do you use the mobile library?


180 people answered this question

If a community shop and/or mobile shop opened in Whatfield how often would you use it?


180 people answered this question





Would you like a Bus shelter to be provided?


154 people answered this question



29 (19%) people would like one bus shelter. 86 (56%) wanted two shelters to be provided and 39 (25%) specifically answered 'No'.

County Council funding for one shelter was available some time ago but Babergh would not grant approval as a 'need' had not been demonstrated.







The Street and Naughton Road attracted 68 people wanting the existing 30 mph limit to be reduced. 102 thought some form of traffic calming should be introduced and 121 wanted pavements.



Wheatfields does not have the same problems as the village's main road nevertheless nearly half those who answered the speed limit question wanted a lower limit. The vote was 60 against 14 for the introduction of traffic calming whilst 15 people wanted additional pavements.

Rectory Road - 59 want a speed limit to be introduced against 12 who don't. The majority were also against any form of traffic calming or pavements in this unspoiled rural lane.




Do you consider the upkeep of roads, pavements and footpaths in Whatfield to be adequate?



Are Street Lights needed in Whatfield?





There is however a majority for the provision of lighting outside both the school and village hall.




Do you consider there is a need for a weight restriction on lorries using the village?


There is concern about the number of heavy lorries. In a later question over 100 people specifically mentioned their concern about HGVs together with 150 who cited road traffic in general.

121 people would like to see more off street parking or lay-by(s). 53 people did not want to see more parking places.




Would you be interested in a car sharing scheme?



30% of those answering the question considered that improvements to village land and tree planting were very important with a further 30% to 40% believing such work to be worthwhile.

It also became apparent that some people do not know where some of the locations mentioned were. (This we hope can be rectified by looking at the map of the Parish earlier in this report).

There is a minority who do not believe such work is necessary.

Although not so enthusiastically supported the majority would also like to see more hedges and the creation of a nature trail.




What do you know about local footpaths and bridleways?



Only 19 people expressed concern with the appearance some privately owned properties. The vast Majority (128) had no concerns.



Would you be willing to support entry in a Best Kept Village competition as a way of improving the appearance of the village?



86 people expressed a willingness to support entry into a Best Kept Village competition as a way of improving the appearance of the village. 46 people said they would not support such action.




Are you concerned about the effect of the following on the village?



The roads and fringes in and around the village received most cause for concern however only a relatively small percentage of people judged this to be a problem.

Roadsides tend to collect litter blown by the wind and passing traffic and there is no evidence to suggest passing traffic generates litter itself.

More regular visits from the road sweeper might be beneficial.

The fact that 15% also mention the School Playing Field does give some concern. This litter must be either be generated by those using the area or blown in from outside.

Young families bring life to a community but the housing market has prevented several ex-Whatfield Children from fulfilling their desire to return to Whatfield.

There is building land available in Whatfield and further studies should be made into exactly where and what development existing residents desire - or not.


